Have You Set Your Goals for 2007?

For many of us the start of a new year marks the beginning of a goal setting process that often loses its momentum by mid-year. This year, I challenge you to refine your goal process to achieve a more powerful result. As you finalize your goals, here are a few things to consider:

Begin by setting the goals that are aligned with your individual purpose. What do you plan to accomplish over the next one, two, or three years? What will it look like when you achieve your personal purpose? It is critical to be clear about what you are trying to accomplish. Without the end in mind, you will not truly know if you ever accomplish the goal.

Give careful consideration to last year's goals. Use your 2006 goals as

planning tools for the future. What were the outcomes of your 2006 successes, and how did they support your personal purpose? Did those outcomes move you closer to realizing your end result? If you missed the mark a bit, what have you learned from the experience so you can achieve a stronger outcome in the future.

Share your goals with others. When you ask others to support your goals, you strengthen your potential for success. Others often provide you resources as well as insight in attaining your goals. In addition, others can offer you just the right amount of encouragement to fulfilling your mission before you toss it aside.


Setting goals does not always mean something new. Setting goals can include identifying what is working well and then,

developing a plan to continue the behavior or initiative. Often, building on what is working can create a more powerful and lasting result.

Make sure the goals are attainable. While "ending world hunger" is a noble cause, it is not realistically achievable in the short term. It is important for your goals to be within your 'circle of influence' and reasonable. Goals that are too aggressive to be accomplished may create feelings of personal failure, when in fact, some progress was made along the way.

So remember, take the time to create goals that will have a lasting effect on your future and your success as an individual.

We have received very positive feedback from the students, teachers, and sponsors on the program. We are in the second year of the program and will finish teaching 2nd grade in February and will kick off 3rd grade in the spring. Our challenges have been expanding, fund raising and getting new volunteers.

We currently have 3 or 4 openings to teach the 3rd

grade program this semester and are looking for volunteers. Volunteers are trained to teach five sessions at one of the 3rd grade classes in the county. The sessions last approximately 45 minutes each and are laid out in detail, so preparation for teaching the class is easy.

We are also looking for additional board members to help with coordination of the program. Board member duties include: solicit funds from local businesses, recruit volunteers to teach the classes, coordinate training for volunteers, track schedules of the volunteers teaching each class, attend school board meetings to report program success, collect and take

photos of the classes for sponsor and volunteer appreciation certificates, submit photos to the Daily News to assist in advertising and sponsorship of JA, create a yearly newsletter recapping the previous years success, and anything else which might arise.


